

The Parenting Challenge

Parents and caregivers are the most essential key players in improving the wellbeing of young children. In our project areas parents face a lot of challenges. This is why Help a Child developed the Parenting Challenge, a method to improve the knowledge, attitude and skills of mothers and fathers in different subjects. In 2017 a pilot was conducted in two of our project areas (Edingeni and Zilakoma) as well as in Arua, Uganda. The

first results under 160 participants were promising and in 2018 Help a Child was invited to the first African Early Childhood Conference in Nairobi to share the results.

Pilot areas in 2017

- 1) Cinya in Arua, Uganda
- 2) Edingeni in Mzimba, Malawi
- 3) Zilakoma in Mzimba, Malawi




Since 2016, we use a scorecard to monitor the quality of CBCCs in our project areas. Results show that between 2016 and 2018, despite some challenges, the quality of CBCCs has clearly improved in terms of community involvement, the capacity of management committees and the quality of curriculum delivery.

Inclusive ECD

Only a few years ago, the enrolment of children with disabilities, like Hilda, was inconceivable due to long walking distances and the lack of encouragement by parents and caretakers. But now this all has changed.

Supported by Help a Child and Livingstonia Synod AIDS Program (LISAP), the community of Chakwantha is collectively ensuring that no child is left behind on education despite his or her physical conditions.

In collaboration with the Ministry of Gender, Children, Disability and Social welfare, Help a Child trains caregivers and mentors to ensure that quality ECD service delivery includes early identification of and interventions for children with special needs. In 2018, **80** caregivers in Mzimba and Nkhatabay participated in the ECD training. To create a long-lasting effect, **20** well-performing caregivers have been selected as mentors to support their colleagues.
