Invi contributes to a world that is free of sexual violence by creating impactful solutions and spreading knowledge and awareness.






35% of women worldwide have exprienced physical or sexual violence

The E2P awareness package brings together men and women to discuss and reflect on gender differences, SGBV and ways to support each other. The community sessions are led by trained facilitators, who also explain the use of the Invi Bracelet to provide rapid protection and to boost self-confidence.



The Invi Bracelet is a non-violent tool that has proven to prevent non-intimate partner assaults. The bracelet, when activated, spreads a foul smell, that deters aggressors and can alarm others.


